

Ask Fr. Jim

Fr. Jim,

What is the Catholic Church's position regarding euthanasia and end of life issues for the dying? Thank you.

Dennis

Hello Dennis.

There seem to be two extremes in dealing with "end of life issues." (a) We must keep humans alive as long as possible, using all possible means, and (b) It is ok to deliberately end life when a person is sick and dying or in great pain, e.g. terminal cancer etc. Both extremes are wrong and not endorsed by the Church's own moral teaching.

We know all life eventually comes to an end either by natural causes or sometimes by accident. The natural causes can be multiple, e.g., from cancer or other serious illness (at any age) or when the body because of age begins to close down naturally. In other words all living things have a created life which by nature is temporary. No one lives on earth forever.

Now, we believers also know that, because of our spiritual souls, we possess eternal life which is a sharing in God's own life. That's why we have no right to deliberately take a human life before its natural/accidental death . . . we are "caretakers, not owners."

So, in the first case, euthanasia is forbidden since it takes life before its normal end. Euthanasia means a human being taking steps in acts that demonstrate a power over life and death which is God's lone. Capital punish is the state's legal right but even that is becoming less and less common because we can separate criminals from society for their normal lifespan.

But your question also raises the misinformation that some good people have as to the end of life and what to do. One can never cause directly the death of another. That is the certain truth. But when a person is "in the process of dying" (whether by old age, by some disease or illness, cancer or congestive heart failure, etc.) there are basic Christian principles that should be followed. One of them is that it is not necessary to try to keep a person who is actually dying alive as long as possible. In other words, in the dying process, the body, and its organs etc. are trying to shut down . . . it's what happens in the dying process. Basically the digestive organs slow down for the simple reason that in the dying process, the body doesn't want to be force-fed which puts an additional burden on the dying person. Ingesting food only causes discomfort because of indigestion, cramps, gas etc. In the case of a dying cancer victim for instance, medication can be given to relieve the terrible pain that the patient might be suffering. To do less would be inhumane. Someone may fear that medication may hasten death when in reality what the medication is doing is removing pain so the body can continue its normal process of shutting down. In other words, comfort measures to ease or minimize pain are not the cause of death. Any medication that basically and directly causes death is simply direct euthanasia and is morally wrong and forbidden.

Sometimes it is required that the family members really come to terms with the loss of a loved one. For them to insist on measures simply to keep their loved one alive when the dying process is taking place is false love and it may be more about their own feelings rather than tender loving care they should be giving to the dying loved one. Sometime people who emphasize "prolife" for their loved ones are really tied up in themselves. Hospice care is the model way of assisting people in the dying process. It is comfort care at its best that does not hasten death in any significant way, but only lets nature take its course with as much medical, emotional and spiritual assistance as possible.
