

Fr. Fred, To The Parishioners

Parishioners who celebrated Sunday morning Masses last week saw me get a bit emotional at the end of Mass. I feel embarrassed when this happens, but alas! The cause was high school parishioner Maya Park's singing the gorgeous hymn "How Beautiful." Maya, as most of you now know, is going with a special group of kids from the Cincinnati Children's Choir to the Vatican to sing for our Holy Father Pope Francis, in addition to her own extra jobs and work, along with her dear mother's, many of you contributed when she "begged" after Mass some months ago. Everything about our young parishioner is beautiful, including her active participation with our choir, her fine work as a student at Roger Bacon, her warm caring smile and her truly "sincere" singing of "How Beautiful."

How beautiful the heart that bled That took all my sin and bore it instead How beautiful the tender eyes That chose to forgive and never despise.

......

How beautiful the feet that bring The sound of good news and the love of the King. How beautiful, how beautiful Is the Body of Christ!

Tears came as Maya and this hymn touched my heart. We had all just experienced a beautiful young woman doing something beautiful. We had just seen our beautiful Eucharistic Lord present on the altar and had taken Him within our hearts. And as I looked out for the final blessing at you, my parish family, I knew absolutely how immensely privileged I was to be gazing on the beautiful Body of Christ. Young and old and in between, healthy and weak, confident and frightened, man and woman, Black, White and Latino, Gay, Lesbian, Straight, married and single, saint and sinner (all of us in both of these last two categories at the same time--for we are all saved "by the love of the King"), stay-at-home parent, civil servant, office worker and factory worker, entrepreneur and waste manager . . . and on and on--creating a gorgeous mosaic far more beautiful even that an oil painting of Christ. You and I together, with none of us missing, is the Body of Christ alive in St. Clement Parish. How beautiful!

Now you know part of the reason why I became emotional, Of course, I would imagine most of us were feeling kind of wrung out and vulnerable after all of the well-deserved coverage of Officer Kim's funeral and witnessing the dignity and grief of his suffering family. A number of you told me so. In retrospect, I wish now I had invited all of our Police Officers in church to stand so that we could acknowledge our support; of course, that would have meant more tears. I had celebrated another beautiful funeral at the same time as Officer Kim's and have been running on empty a lot lately, visiting sick folks, going to meetings and also reconnecting with friends.

Most basically, I'm feeling tired. Actually, as I write this, I'm on vacation. One final reason for the emotion is the deep joy I experience both before and after Mass, when so many of you, dear beautiful Body of Christ, say hi to me, shake hands, give me a hug (or some, even a kiss), tease me--some, mercilessly --or allow me to tease you, bear with my forgetfulness, quiz me, affirm me, invite me; one of you even wanted to take a photo of me on your phone to send to an adult son out of the country.

I absolutely believe that Fr. Jim would affirm and agree with most everything I wrote above. It's just that he's more in control of his emotions. I hope and pray that some of the young men in our parish pick up our joy as priests and listen closely to the Lord who is likely inviting them to share our lives. If the Lord is calling you to be a priest, nothing will make you deep-down happier than to answer his call.

Thanks for letting me emote. Tears came again as I wrote this letter. I'll get over it! How beautiful! Oh, happy Independence Day!

FAITH FORMATION by Emily Mulvey

Ask Fr. Jim

Fr. Jim,

What happens if a person fails to mention a serious sin that they remembered between the end of their act of contrition and the point where the priest says, "I absolve you of your sins..." Was that sin forgiven? Do I need to go back to confession? I'm all mixed up and worried.

Hello Cody,

No, Cody, your confession was certainly valid. Take my word for it and be at peace. There is one basic principle that applies here. Your intention! It was to confess all your sins, correct? It can happen that anyone at all can forget to mention something in confession...it's not that unusual at all. There is no need for you to go back to confession. All your sins, present and past, are contained in your intention of confessing everything. God knows your heart and the priest understands that that can sometimes happen even to the most sincere person. When the priest gives you absolution and says the words, "I absolve you from your sins," his intention is that his absolution for all ALL sins, remembered or forgotten just as your intention was to confess all of them.

The last thing the Sacrament of Confession should be is a place of worry and fear. It should be a place of time and peace even though some sins may be difficult to confess or put into words. Confession of sin does not require details except in very rare cases. Remember, God is a God of mercy and everything about Jesus' life and teaching was to bring healing and peace. So, forget all the thoughts and fears about whether you should have interrupted the priest. No, don't do that. You were not deliberately hiding anything and you were sincere.

Here is an example that might help you. Consider a person who has not been to confession for twenty years. And I can assure you that all priests have heard more than a few confessions of that sort. In all those years he realizes that he has committed, in his own estimation, "every sin in the book." How long do you think it would take for him to go back over all those years and list all the possible serious sins he ever committed? Actually, another twenty years would likely not be enough time. But that's not what God wants or the church requires for valid confession. It's not supposed to be a torture session ever. The purpose of confession is (a) sorrow for sin and (b) a firm purpose of amendment. And in fact, even though the title of the Sacrament is "Confession," a better title is that of "Reconciliation" because this sacrament is more about God's loving forgiveness than it is about sin itself. We know we are all sinners. That's a given because of our wounded human nature. So, when you go to confession, do the best you can to confess your sins, but do not worry or obsess as to whether you were able to remember each and every sin. Recall those you can without going contortions and include all the sins in your confession in a general way, e.g. "I'm sorry for ALL the sins since my last confession and for all the sins of my life." Leave the confessional in peace and gratitude once again for God's love and care for you... and his forgiveness. The next time, examine your conscience only from the time you went to confession last. Remember the saying: When God forgives you sins, he throws them all into the deepest sea in the world and he posts a sign for the sinner to see: "No fishing allowed!" The past is gone and forgiven forever.

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
